The Standard of Excellence in Teacher Preparation

It's official! Our NCATE approval has been continued through 2015! The education programs in the School of Education were first accredited in 2003 by NCATE (National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education), the gold standard for education programs. The accreditation visit last spring was to determine whether the program would continue to be accredited. Faculty and administration prepared diligently in the School of Education, as well as all other departments that offer teacher licensure programs at LU. A countdown clock in the education office counted the days to the exit interview. The NCATE team voted unanimously that all standards had been met. The team's decision brought us one step closer to our goal of full accreditation through 2015. Students and faculty crowded the hallways to hear the decision announced. Their cheers and noisemakers were heard throughout the building. After the announcement, they all joined hands along the hallways to thank the Lord for the successful recommendation from the NCATE Team. The Unit Accreditation Board met in October for the official decision. We are rejoicing!

Experience Update



This semester has been the most exciting of all my semesters at Liberty University. I arrived in Tianjin, China on Thursday, September 1 and jumped into teaching the next Monday. The students are so loving towards me and accepting of me as their teacher. The school is also amazing. It is centered around Him and the staff is so community driven. I have gotten to know so many new people. I have also been able to learn about the Chinese culture and the Korean culture, as many of the students are Korean due to the fact that they must have a foreign passport to be admitted into the school.

Not only have I been able to teach in a new environment, I have also been able to visit the Great Wall of China, Beijing, and a beach town a few hours from Tianjin. I am so thankful that He has allowed me to have this amazing experience! I believe He ordained me to come here so that He could prepare me for a future in missionary work. I believe He has definitely called me to overseas work and this is just the beginning!

Beginning January 2010, two changes have been implemented in the field experience requirements for licensure in administration and supervision. First, early field experiences are now embedded in EDUC 640, 641, 646, 647, and 648 for M.Ed. candidates and in 742 and 747 for Ed.S. and Ed.D. candidates. Each of these early field experiences is 24 hours in length and aligns with the activities of the course benchmark assignment. A total of 120 early field experiences will be accumulated before enrolling in the internship (EDUC 699-01), which requires an additional 200 hours. By the end of the internship a cumulative number of 320 hours will be logged.

A second revision is that these 320 hours must represent five settings: elementary, middle, high school, district/central office, and agency. The regulations do not stipulate a minimum number of hours for each setting—just that each must be represented. Candidates frequently are confused as to what agencies might be acceptable for a setting. Any government or private agency that provides support services to school students or their families is acceptable. Some examples include social, welfare, health, and child protection agencies. Types of agencies and their names vary from state to state, so candidates in doubt about what is acceptable are encouraged to contact course and internship instructors.

VERA 2009 Distinguished Paper

Each year the Virginia Educational Research Association (VERA) selects a paper presented at the annual conference as the Distinguished Paper. The distinction for 2010 was bestowed upon Drs. Samuel Smith and John Pantana for their study entitled *Preservice Second-Career Teachers in a Blended Online-Residential Preparation Program: Profiling Characteristics and Motivations*. As recipients of the award, Smith and Pantana presented the paper in May at the Denver conference of the American Educational Research Association (AERA).

The study, published in *The Teacher Educators' Journal*, examined preservice second-career teachers, their motivations for switching careers, and their perceptions of the profession. Participants were graduate students in LU's Master of Arts in Teaching program (n=311). Profiles, characteristics, motivations, and perceptions were explored using the FIT-Choice (Factors Influencing Teaching Choice) Scale and focus groups.





ASCD Opportunities

LU's student chapter of ASCD is growing and opportunities for professional development are increasing. If you are not yet a member, consider joining now. Although ASCD stands for the Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development, it is open to all future and present educators, not just supervisors or curriculum developers. For only \$35 you become a member for a year and receive a variety of benefits: journals, newsletters, and discounts on conferences and books. That is more than a 60% discount over the regular rate if you were to join directly through ASCD.

A new benefit is that the LU chapter provides grants for members to attend the annual conference. The dollar amount depends on funds available. However, it typically will pay the full registration fee and will provide spending money to be used toward hotel, meals, or transportation. The spending money will most likely not cover all expenses. All grant applications must be received by December 1. Recipients will be chosen at random and will be notified within 60 days of the conference date. 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What is assessment? "Assessment is a process that focuses on student learning, a process that involves reviewing and reflecting on practice as academics have always done, but in a more planned and careful way" (Palomba & Banata, 1999, p. 1).

Assessment Update

Assessment is focused on student learning. We use assessment to meet internal and external reporting requirements, but at its heart, assessment is designed to improve student learning.



Assessment is a process that involves reviewing and reflecting on practice. Practice informed by research is a key element of successful teaching. Assessment provides us with timely, focused, and applicable research.

Assessment should be carried out in a planned and careful way. That is the core idea of Program Learning Assessment Cycle for Excellence (PLACE), developed by Dr. Karen Parker. PLACE is a planned and careful methodology for executing assessment. As we all complete our part of PLACE we build informed excellence into our programs and ourselves.

The SOE's Ed.D. dissertation process has some new features that were introduced this Fall: An Updated Dissertation Guide, A SharePoint Dissertation Portal, and a New Course and New Course Content. On The Dissertation Guide site information about the dissertation process and items necessary to complete the dissertation process can be found. The SharePoint Dissertation Portal is a medium where doctoral candidates can access useful dissertation resources and can collaborate with committee members and peers during the dissertation process. Program Specialist Update

Liberty offers a M.Ed. as a program specialist in early childhood, gifted, math, and reading. The following is an update related to reading and math specialist candidates:

Three years of full-time teaching experience in an accredited school in which the teaching of reading is an important responsibility. Teaching experience can be acquired before, during, or after the master's program, but it is not required for admission or completion of the DEGREE. However, ONE YEAR OF FULL-TIME TEACHING EXPERIENCE IS REQUIRED PRIOR TO EDUC 699, INTERN-SHIP. Candidates who do not have at least one year of full-time teaching experience must register for EDUC 698 Directed Practicum. If three years of full-time teaching experience is not completed by the end of the program, the degree will be conferred but licensure will be delayed until three years of teaching experience is completed.

Launching of Sport Management Graduate Program

Program Update>

Educational Technology



The School of Education now officially offers a new program in educational technology and distance learning, offered as part of the family of concentrations in our MEd in Teaching and Learning program. This is a non-licensure program and is unique in that students enrolled in this program could seek opportunities in traditional k-12 settings (in both curriculum development/ instructional roles as well as technology leadership and administration) as well as working in governmental, military, higher education and corporate entities for instructional design and instructional technology implementation and integration.

The courses as part of this program cover the continuum of classroom level instructional technology integration to broader issues of technology system- or organization-wide planning. This therefore emphasizes both the micro use of technology with a single student to the macro level of planning of technology use by all within a system. Students, as part of this newly offered program, develop instructional plans for technology use, system-level technology plans, and work using the latest in technologies to examine effectiveness and applicability for learning.

One more unique aspect to this program involves its break from the traditional method of course delivery offered as part of LUO online courses. The courses are structured as a mix of asynchronous (any time/ any where learning tools such as discussion boards) and synchronous ("live" tools of communication such as IM, video conferencing, and virtual worlds) models of instructional delivery and learning, employing latest technologies to connect students to professors, other students and the course materials and skills emphasized.
