Rationale

All of the proposed changes originate from the History Department's 2007-8 Third Year Review and its 2007 NCATE report.

The History Department believes that its Social Science majors should take all of its survey offerings (GEOG 200, HIEU 201, HIEU 202, HIUS 221, and HIUS 222) as foundational courses. HIUS 222 is the only foundational course currently not required.

Students currently majoring in Social Sciences do not have to take a capstone course like history majors. Adding HIST 490 – Senior Seminar (an existing course) would provide the department the opportunity to examine how prepared its Social Sciences majors are for graduation. Furthermore, with the university's emphasis on assessment, the department needs a capstone course in each of its majors where it can meet its assessment responsibilities. Adding HIST 490 would provide that course for this major.

ECNC 213 – Principles of Economics I (Micro) will provide more depth in economics proper than either ECNC 110 and HIUS 360 and places emphasis on Free Enterprise, a key component of one of the History Department's Learning Outcomes.

Adding GOVT 200 will strengthen the students' backgrounds in the free enterprise system and constitutional government, key parts of the department's Learning Outcomes.

With all of these changes, the total hours for the major will remain 120.

Rationale

All of the proposed changes originate from the History Department's 2007-8 Third Year Review and its 2007 NCATE report. Furthermore, the changes are being recommended after consulting with Drs. Karen Parker and Michelle Goodwin from the School of Education.

After a careful review of the Virginia Department of Education Standards of Learning for the Social Sciences in Elementary Education, the department determined the old Core cluster of Social Science courses did not adequately prepare future teachers for meeting the SOLs. The new cluster provides greater breadth with its emphasis on foundational courses. This is particularly important in preparing teachers to teach in elementary school.

The department determined that one area of particular weakness was in Virginia History. The department has approved the creation of HIUS 390 – History of Virginia and added to this core sequence.

• SR0209-04 (Second Read) Faculty Development and Welfare Committee

CLST 104 will also provide interaction between faculty and students which establishes high academic expectation and encourages connection to community and university life.

Rationale: College Transition and Study is a summer course designed for first-time freshmen who are seeking to develop academic success strategies prior to a full-time semester class load. Many students entering the college arena are underprepared for university level work. CLST 104 is a study skills course designed to train students in study strategies needed for success in college and to facilitate academic, spiritual, and social development and transition as well as the understanding of Judeo-Christian ethics and values within a Christian university setting. CLST 104 will also provide interaction between faculty and students which establishes high academic expectation and encourages connection to community and university life which leads to the retention of students.

CLST 104 was birthed out of the recognition by both the Bruckner Learning Center and the Athletic department that many first-time freshmen do not have the time management and academic success skills to succeed in college work. We looked at several other institutions that offer summer transition or bridge programs (UVA, University of Kentucky, and UNC, to name a few) and saw that a summer class that allows for community building, academic success, and transition to the university life leads to retention of new students over the long-term.

Course Description:

WRSP 285/385 Worship Orchestra

1 hour

Prerequisite: Audition or Permission of instructor.

This is an instrumental ensemble that provides students opportunity to experience and perform the various styles of music used in a worship program of a large evangelical worship ministry. The ensemble usually includes rhythm section, wind, brass, string and percussion instruments. On occasion, the group may include vocals. A primary function of the group is to provide accompaniment to the choral ensembles in the Department of Worship and Music Studies. Lab fee.

Rationale: The current ensemble offerings, available to worship majors, are limited to choral, guitar or the ministry teams ensembles. The Worship Orchestra will provide a unique instrumental option, offering a broader experience which will include coordinated efforts with the department choirs for combined choral and instrumental presentations -- critical for worship ministry preparation.

o Course Description:

WRSP 286/386 The Gospel Choir

1 hour

Prerequisite: Audition by Department of Worship and Music Studies

The Gospel Choir is a 25 member choir representing the diverse African American Worship Traditions through music and ministry. The ensemble serves in an official public relations capacity for the University and Center for Worship. The Gospel Choir generally participates in annual music events, weekly convocations, TRBC worship services, LU fundraising events and an annual spring tour. The singing group participates in annual missions ministry during the course of each academic calendar. The Gospel Choir is approved for credit toward the worship and music studies degree.

Rationale: Worship students are to take a minimum of six ensemble hours to fulfill requirements leading to the BS in Worship and Music Studies degree. Four approved ensembles presently provided by the Department of Worship and Music Studies help meet this need. Each of these choral groups are large, 100 plus member, groups.

As the worship department enrollment has increased, and the general population of the university has grown, it has become obvious that alternative ensemble opportunities for worship majors should be developed. Simply put, not all students can be in the same groups. The Gospel Choir provides a credible option for participation in other performance groups. The addition of The Gospel Choir provides a smaller, auditioned vocal group that can be used for credit toward the worship degree.

• Course Description:

WRSP 287/387 Guitar Worship Ensemble

Prerequisite: Audition by instructor

An auditioned guitar ensemble specializing in the study of jazz or classical music. Reading and musical interpretation or rhythms and notation are stressed. Improvisational and accompaniment skills are developed. The ensemble performs on campus once each semester.

Rationale: Worship students are required to take a minimum of six ensemble hours to fulfill requirements leading to the BS in Worship and Music Studies degree. Five ensemble hours are presently provided by the Department of Worship and Music Studies. The addition of the Guitar Worship Ensemble will provide an instrumental ensemble option for students seeking to broaden their understanding and proficiency within the context of an instrumental group.... Our proposal is to make the Guitar Worship Ensemble a permanent ensemble option of the worship student's curriculum at Liberty. While available to the Liberty University student body in general, the courses would be managed and directed by Department of Worship and Music Studies personnel faculty. This proposed instrumental group will help meet the ensemble requirements for the BS in Worship and Music Studies degree.

• SB0309-07 (First Read) Psychology: Deletion of Adult Development Specialization (Effective Fall 2009)

Rationale: The psychology department currently offers two specializations in human development, this specialization and one in Child/Adolescent Development. However, these two specializations currently differ in only two courses. All other requirements are identical. Moreover, there are currently only 18 students out of 663 majors (2.7%) that have selected Adult Development as their specialization. We propose not offering this specialization to students who declare psychology in the future or who wish to change their specialization in the future. In a separate proposal, the child/adolescent development specialization will be modified to accommodate those future students who wish to focus on adult development.
