
God Laughs

Missions Emphasis Week

Two weeks ago, Liberty University hosted Missions Emphasis Week. The keynote speakers for the week were Steve Saint, Wess Stafford (Compassion International), and David Platt (Author: Radical). The theme for the week was Ethnos- "...repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in his name to all

nations (ethnos)..." -Luke 24:47

I spoke with Chris Biddix, one of the workers with the Center for Global Ministries. When asking him about this semester's Missions Emphasis week, he made the comment, "We feel this was the best one yet." This year they added a new opportunity for the students, called "ExperienceEthnos." For three nights, the students could come in and experience different cultures firsthand. They had a night for India, a night for Thailand, and a night for Bible Translation. A missions organization based out of these three put together the program for the night. During the night for India, for example, students came in and took their shoes off, ate Indian food, and heard from a missionary from that area. These three nights served to give the students a taste of what other cultures are like to spark interest.

Along with the three convocation speakers, Johnnie Moore, Vice President for Executive Projects and Media Relations, and Campus Pastor, gave the message on Wednesday night to the students. He spoke to them about surrendering their lives to what God had for them- to not run away from what He has, but to embrace it.

The volume of students involved in this year's event was much larger than in semesters past. A lot of missions organizations said that they talked to the most students ever this semester, compared to previous semesters. Wycliffe mentioned that they ran out of sign-up sheets as a result of talking to so many students! We had over 60 organizations and over 120 missionaries on campus this semester.

One story was relayed back to us that a student walked up to a missionary in the back hall of DeMoss. He was listening to what the missionary was doing overseas, pulled out his wallet, and handed over all the cash he had in his wallet to the missionary. "To hear of students doing this is really encouraging," Chris said. "The missionaries want to pour into the students and see them go into the mission field, but it is awesome to see the students give *back* to the missionaries."

We look forward to what God will do through Missions Emphasis Week in the upcoming semesters. Bringing in missionaries and opening the eyes of students to God's heartbeat is our goal and it is exciting to see how God moves each semester!

Women's Health and Wellness Seminar

On Thursday, February 24th, the Office of Student Care along with the Center for Women's Ministries hosted the 4th annual Women's Health and Wellness Seminar. The panel of women for the evening included Professor Tracey Turner, RN (Nursing Department), Professor Sundi Donovan (Psychology Department), and Donna

Barber (LaHaye Fitness Instructor). Over 400 girls attended the event. The panelist answered questions that girls all over campus asked, questions such as "How much water should I drink every day?" and "What should I do if my friend is cutting herself and I promised not to tell?"

Dr. Monica Rose Brennan was the guest speaker, and she encouraged the students to seek God and trust in His provision and healing. Vendors from the community had booths for the students to find information on eating healthy, exercising, as well as programs here at Liberty that the students can be a part of. The event was a great success and we look forward to seeing the impact it will have in years to come.



Carolina Creek Camp & CYM

I interviewed Keith Oglesby, Executive Director at Carolina Creek Camp in Huntsville, Texas. He was here at Liberty University recruiting students for their leadership team for this upcoming summer. I asked Keith why he came all the way to Liberty University to recruit. He replied, "The students here at Liberty University are kingdom minded. They have the head-knowledge and theology, coupled with the motivation and desire, which is rare to find both together."

The two objectives Carolina Creek Camp tries to accomplish are (1), to provide, in a camp setting, a laboratory for Liberty University students to put knowledge into practice. "They learn about principles and trends in class, and then they can put them into practice at the camp," Keith said. And (2), to train

Liberty University students to be more successful in ministry (regardless of the field they choose). "We teach them 100 initiative games with spiritual emphasis that they can use later no matter where they end up- to break the ice and form relationships with students."

Keith commented, "We want to enhance what [the students] are learning at Liberty University; and with a partnership with the Center for Youth Ministries, to develop well-rounded, educated, high energy students to evangelize the world!"

Christ said, in Matthew 9:37-38, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." There is a great need to teach children and teens about Christ. Carolina Creek Camp is a great place to serve to reach out to these students and gain experience that will partner with what students are learning here at Liberty University.

Carolina Creek Camp has two requirements for their leaders. First, they must have a strong and growing relationship with

Christ- right now. Second, they must love kids. "Kids and youth are what we are all about!" Keith said.

"The Center for Youth Ministries has been very gracious and accommodating. They have seen a difference in the students who spent the summer with us," Keith commented.

The most humbling part for me to hear, as an alumnus of Liberty University, was when Keith said that out of the 100 staff members they recruit each summer from all over the country, the best are from LU. Students- continue to study hard, look for opportunities to serve while in school, and continue to make an impact on the world!
