"It is estimated that over the past two years, the number of school children in homeless families has risen by 75 to 100 percent in many school districts."

-National Association for the Education of Homeless Children & Youth (NAEHCY), September 2009

"In the 2007-08 school year, an estimated 794,600 homeless children and youth were enrolled in public schools ... a 17% increase from 2006-07."

-Education for Homeless Children and Youths Program, National Center for Homeless Education (NCHE) April 2009 NAEHCY estimates that more than 1 million homeless children PK-12 were enrolled in public schools in 2008-09."

Because of the home foreclosure crisis, an estimated 2 million children will lose their homes over the next two years."

- Substance Abuse
- Gang Activity
- Homelessness
 - Approximately 1 out of every 50 children in America are homeless...about 1.5 million in all.



- Poor Attendance & Participation
- Increased Frequency of Relocations
- Poor Brain Development
- Illiteracy & Low Achievement
- Learners Unready to Learn
- Inadequate Parental Support
- Demand on Exceptional Education Services

- Examine the impact of poverty on learning & development
- Use culturally relevant curriculum
- Develop students of culture and difference
