However, we receive a clue to his character from Heb. 11:4 <i>By faith Abel offered to God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts; and through it he being dead still speaks.</i> Abel is a significant character in the Bible even though his life is thinly reported on. Able is significant to us because he is a picture of the person and ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ, shepherd of God's people.

Evil Shepherds	Text: (Jer. 23:1-4) "Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of My pasture!" says the LORD. ² Therefore thus says the LORD God of Israel against the shepherds who feed My people: "You have scattered My flock, driven them away, and not attended to them. Behold, I will attend to you for the evil of your doings," says the LORD. ³ "But I will gather the remnant of My flock out of all countries where I have driven them, and bring them back to their folds; and they shall be fruitful and increase. ⁴ I will set up shepherds over them who will feed them; and they shall fear no more, nor be dismayed, nor shall they be lacking," says the LORD.
	Text: (Ezek. 34:1-10) And the word of the Lord came to me, saying, 2 "Son of man, prophesy against the shepherds of Israel, prophesy and say to them, 'Thus says the Lord God to the shepherds: "Woe to the shepherds of Israel who feed themselves! Should not the shepherds feed the flocks? 3 You eat the fat and clothe yourselves with the wool; you slaughter the fatlings, but you do not feed the flock. 4 The weak you have not strengthened, nor have you healed those who were sick, nor bound up the broken, nor brought back what was driven away, nor sought what was lost; but with force and cruelty you have ruled them. 5 So they were scattered because there was no shepherd; and they became food for all the beasts of the field when they were scattered. 6 My sheep wandered through all the mountains, and on every high hill; yes, My flock was scattered over the whole face of the earth, and no one was seeking or searching for them."
Irresponsible Shepherds	7 'Therefore, you shepherds, hear the word of the Lord: 8 "As I live," says the Lord God, "surely because My flock became a prey, and My flock became food for every beast of the field, because there was no shepherd, nor did My shepherds search for My flock, but the shepherds fed themselves and did not feed My flock"—9 therefore, O shepherds, hear the word of the Lord! 10 Thus says the Lord God: "Behold, I am against the shepherds, and I will require My flock at their hand; I will cause them to cease feeding the sheep, and the shepherds shall feed themselves no more; for I will deliver My flock from their mouths, that they may no longer be food for them."
	Context: The prophet takes the reader or hearer back to before the exile and God rehearses their failures before Him and the people. He excoriates them for their selfishness and greed at the expense of the people. David is mentioned as he will be a righteous shepherd during the millennium. The final king, priest and prophet will not mistreat the sheep for He will the Good Shepherd, Messiah.

Greedy Shepherds	 Text: (Zech. 11:4-9) 4 Thus says the Lord my God, "Feed the flock for slaughter, 5 whose owners slaughter them and feel no guilt; those who sell them say, 'Blessed be the Lord, for I am rich'; and their shepherds do not pity them. 6 For I will no longer pity the inhabitants of the land," says the Lord. "But indeed I will give everyone into his neighbor's hand and into the hand of his king. They shall attack the land, and I will not deliver them from their hand." 7 So I fed the flock for slaughter, in particular the poor of the flock I took for myself two staffs: the one I called Beauty, and the other I called Bonds; and I fed the flock. 8 I dismissed the three shepherds in one month. My soul loathed them, and their soul also abhorred me. 9 Then I said, "I will not feed you. Let what is dying die, and what is perishing perish. Let those that are left eat each other's flesh." Context: The two preceding chapters of Zechariah (9 and 10) present a positive scene where Messiah is portrayed as a caring and loving shepherd of God's people. But in chapter 11 a revolting and repulsive scene is presented in a drama looking at the people of God after their rejection of Messiah during His earthly sojourn. After 70 years in a foreign land of humiliation and 400 years under the control of one nation after another, are the leaders and priests following God now and helping His "sheep?" No, as the text indicates they are greedy and have become rich at the expense of the sheep. Their total rejection of Jesus the Messiah will be rewarded with judgment which occurred when Rome destroyed Jerusalem and the temple (11:1-3). God promised that since they have rejected the true shepherd He will give them a fool for a shepherd. This will be the antichrist (11:15-16).
