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# Sunday Schools in the U.S. - The 100 Largest

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This 8th annual listing of the 100 largest Sunday Schools in the U.S. is the most exhaustive ever assembled. In previous years, churches which did not submit their attendance records were lef off the list. This year, however, *Christian Life* has made every attempt to secure all the facts Those who didn't report were listed in the position indicated by our investigation. So here they are—for your study and analysis—the super churches in America.

# SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN THE U.S.-The 1000 Largest

he listing of the nation's largest Sunday Schools first appeared eight years ago, shocking the complacent church world which thought Sunday Schools were dying. The opposite now was apparent. Crowds were attending some Sunday Schools. Neighborhoods were reached by busing. Attendance contests didn't turn off sophisticated Americans, but rather got them excited.

Large Sunday Schools were getting the job done, most of them using oldfashioned methods. Their workers canvassed neighborhoods and gathered for all-night prayer meetings. Their ministers preached to great crowds and "gave invitations" to come forward and receive Christ. These large churches had soul-winning Sunday Schools.

When 12 Sunday Schools in America averaged 2,000 or more a week eight years ago, everyone gasped. And few believed *Christian Life's* prediction that there would be 100 that large by 1980. We are one-third there; this year, there are 33 on the list Christian Life also predicted ar individual Sunday School would aver age 10,000 by 1980. Many thought it was an unrealistic guess. When Jerry Falwell of Thomas Road Baptist Church, Lynchburg, Va., skyrocketed to 10,817 for a one-time big day in November 1970, many still thought the 10,000 barrier couldn't be broken on a weekly basis. But First Baptist Church, Hammond, Ind., averaged 13,561 this last year. Pastor Jack Hyles seems to have no limitations; he at-

tracted an unbelievable 30,527 to Sunday School last December.

"Hyles is unreal; he shouldn't be counted with other churches," one pastor exclaimed. "He's a whole denomination in one building."

Hyles challenged Alvin Dark, manager of the Oakland A's, to an attendance contest. The world's largest Sunday School believes they can have more in Sunday School than the world champion A's can attract to a baseball game.

"That's one game I want to lose," replied Dark.

Eight years ago, most of the large Sunday Schools were independent Baptist. "We were shocked to discover we were not the leaders," declared a Southern Baptist magazine. The independent Baptist basked in the light of new-found glory.

Then Christian Life discovered the growth of the Baptist Bible Fellowship and labeled it "the fastest growing denomination in the U.S." (from 13 churches to over 2,700 in a short 25-year span).

But the spotlight now has shifted to the Southern Baptists with 32 on this year's list. There are 20 independent Baptist churches on the list, 15 Baptist Bible Fellowship churches, as well as churches from other denominations such as Nazarene, Assemblies of God and Foursquare. A total of 19 different denominations or Protestant groups are represented on this year's survey.

For the first time, the Baptists comprise the ten largest (Calvary Temple, Denver, Colo., slipped off the list as other churches registered faster growth). The Baptists also still dominate the chart with 75 listings. However, they are slipping in strength. There were 84 Baptist churches on the listing two years ago.

When the listing first appeared, it

included several Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian churches. At one time, the Cross of Glory Lutheran, Church, Minneapolis, was 27th. However, these mainline denominational churches appear to have experienced stagnation while newer evangelisticoriented Sunday Schools have leap-

frogged over them to get on the list.

Three new churches are on the list this year that were not in existence when it was first published eight years ago: The Open Door Church, Chambersburg, Pa.; Canyon Creek Baptist Church, Richardson, Tex.; and Calvary Temple, Springfield, Ill., which has exploded to 2,017 in attendance in seven short years.

Fourteen come from Texas, the highest listed state. Eleven come from California, with Florida having nine, and Georgia and Ohio having eight each. The greater Los Angeles area has nine churches on the list. The Dallas-Fort Worth area of Texas has six.

Christian Life continues to receive complaints about the listing. First, some Sunday Schools are charged with lying about their figures. The magazine does not guarantee the published figures; it only requires two officers in each church to verify that the attendance figures are accurate and have been published to the congregation. It is assumed a whole congregation can't be deceived.

Second, protesting letters claim that Christian Life is frustrating average pastors by publicizing impossible goals.

"When you publish a story of a church growing from 150 to 1,538 in five years (the Open Door Church, Chambersburg, Pa.), you frustrate average pastors with average abilities," a critic charged.

small Free Will Baptist Church set a goal of 5,000 in Sunday School. When he couldn't reach 300, he wrote a suicide note and left his clothes on the bank of a lake. After a short time, his conscience smote him and he returned to town confessing to the "embarrassment of failure."


However, although some Sunday School workers may have been frustrated, thousands have written appreciation.

"I read where Dallas Billington built the world's largest Sunday School with an eighth grade education, so I figured I could do it too," wrote Pastor Bill Monroe who began Florence Baptist Temple five years ago and averaged 1,034 this last year.

Critics also have accused *Christian Life* of emphasizing quantity while neglecting quality. This is a reckless charge. A careful count of the articles in our pages will reveal more space given to small churches with good programs than to large churches.

Criticism also has been leveled against single services which combine Sunday School and worship services.

"They are not a Sunday School," claimed one West Coast pastor. "If I counted my 11 a.m. crowd, I'd be larger." However, because they call themselves Sunday Schools, they are listed by *Chris*-

Finally, cries of foul-play have be heard over the years about large Sund Schools that list chapels. Highland Pa-Baptist Church, Chattanooga, average 6,819 last year. Half the attendance was 73 chapels away from the main camp yet they were listed at the higher lo because (1) the church could have bu them to the main location but chose to ke a neighborhood witness, (2) the prope (assets and liabilities) is controlled the mother church, and (3) the chap are pastored by students from Tennes-Temple College, located in the michurch. Since the attendance thrust all the Sunday School missions has cofrom the mother church, Christian 1 has listed the total attendance.

#### Busing Boom Tops Out

Many large churches rode the busicrest to new attendance heights. A tyears ago, everyone seemed to be buyibuses. Today the picture has changed. I Sunday School bus movement seems thave "topped out." There are many wistill reach communities with buses, athousands are won to Christ through hvisitation. But we no longer find unbridoptimism. Some churches are selling extra buses.

"What happened to all the bus coferences?" someone asked recento-Interest has slackened. Thomas Role Baptist Church once registered over 5,000 to study its busing program; the year a reported 300 were there. Main others closed down their busing seminars

There are several reasons why super enthusiasm over the buses deflated. First the recession hit. Soaring gas price and spiraling costs of used buses force some out of the ministry.

"We once bought gas for 17 cents, new we pay 47 cents. It used to cost us 85 cent to bring one child to Sunday School, new we pay \$2.25 per bus rider," says Dr. Grey Dixon, Indianapolis Baptist Temple.


Those who bought buses like instanmashed potatoes found that the buministry is *hard work*. When they dis covered it took 10 hours of visitation of Saturday to get 100 riders, the superficia enthusiasts sold their buses. Those will a compassion for the lost stuck by the stuff. double their attendance. To do this, they went on television and radio, built larger buildings, hired more staff and incurred debts.

"The super aggressive churches ended up with super debts," one pastor noted.

Today's sky has some clouds for the large churches. Both Rex Humbard and Jerry Falwell had an encounter with the Security and Exchange Commission, but appear to be pulling out of financial trouble. Others pulled in their financial belt when the recession hit. Expansion slowed with less money to advertise and hire staff. When others reached their

debt ceiling, they hit another snag in their growth pattern.

The large churches continue to push upward at their own rate. Those whose mushroom growth was tied to media, advertisements and busing have topped out.

"Why does First Baptist Church of Hammond continue to grow?" many ask.

"Because our growth has been tied to soul-winning," Hyles answers. He notes that their aim is not church growth but soul-winning. The lost are won to Christ in the homes, streets and factories of the Calumet region of Indiana; busing happens to be the way to get these people to church. Their growth has not been tied to expensive techniques. Then again, the explanation of growth is Jack Hyles. He will never be quenched in his desire to win the lost.

Today most pastors feel they will still grow, but few boast a goal of 10,000. *Guarded optimism* is the by-word for those in the large churches; they have become realistic.

Excitement that grabs the public is no longer being generated only by the largest Sunday Schools, however, even when Hyles had 2,258 more this year than last. 
not against flesh and blood, not against people or political parties, but against the unseen principalities and powers of darkness. It is no secret that a spiritist medium high in the government has had tremendous influence over what has been taking place in Argentina until recently.

So we are praying earnestly that God will not only spare our lives to continue preaching the Gospel, if that is His perfect will; but we are crying out to the Sovereign Lord of the universe to bring Argentines to a place of national repentance for the sins that have crippled all efforts to find a solution to the chaos that is coming upon us.

It is with a deep sense of joy that I report that there is a powerful moving of the Holy Spirit in Argentina today. In many different denominational groups, there is a stirring of the dry bones, an awakening, an increasing impatience with the doldrums of the status quo. In some cases, those of us who have restudied the Scriptures and have returned to New Testament beliefs and practices, have been "frozen out" or directly expelled; but in other cases, Spirittransformed Christians have been able to stay on, carrying whole churches into a marvelous new dimension by manifesting love and patience, while emphasizing "new" truths that have been in the Bible all the time.

Undoubtedly there has been some wildfire and personality clashes, especially at first; but by and large, there has been a refreshing new working of the Spirit, marked by a strong increase in attendance and spiritual activity, especially among young people. Meetings have come alive with the singing of hundreds of newlycomposed choruses that run the entire gamut of spiritual expression, from joyous praise to deep and moving worship. Some are translated from English, but more than 50 percent are Bible passages set to beautiful Argentine-composed melodies. At times one has the feeling that the Holy Spirit has actually returned to us the very music composed by David and others of ancient times.

Meetings run much longer now (in the



groups that are experiencing this renewall and preaching may last an hour, but no one thinks of the time. And usually when meetings are over, there is much lingering for prayer and precious fellowship in the Lord. The outstanding mark of present day communion among Spirit-led Christians is love, love and more love—love that leaps over all barriers of race, class of denominational differences. We have learned in a practical way that blessed cooperation is possible in spite of some lack of agreement as to modes of baptism, or the work of the Holy Spirit, etc.

Bible messages constantly emphasize such basic truths as the absolute Lordship of Christ, the oneness of the Body, disciple ship, holiness in daily living, and humility and understanding in all human relationships. Families are adjusting to Biblicat
