I found this book by searching Quicklink, Library, entering World War II, selecting Just Books and All fields in LUCAS (Liberty University library catalog) and it retrieved 1377 hits; then narrowed the search using quotation marks around the key phrase, refined the search by selecting Subject and edit Language which provided 16 results.
